Marv and I joined Friendship Force several years ago to enjoy the company of others and were impressed that it's founding was based on the idea of reaching out to citizens of other countries to provide a taste of American culture and to obtain a reciprocal taste of theirs. We thought the idea to project our nation's best virtues so that citizens of other countries could learn about and see the qualities of our county was quite praiseworthy.

Question: What makes visiting another country through the FF different that just touring a foreign county on your own?

Answer: It's that personal connection you make with your hosts seeing a new place through their eyes and spending time with them to learn about their culture and customs. It's a much richer experience than visiting a country and staying in hostels or Airbnb's.

Those of us who belong to Utah FF may not realize how critical it is for our club to provide enough hosts so that we can offer the same experience to folks from other clubs who visit our Utah club. This summer we were hard pressed to find enough overnight hosts for the Cincinnati club. Opening one's home to other clubs is a gift we'd like to continue to give so as to enable us to travel to enjoy the friend-ships and visit invitations from other clubs. If the lack of time or money are keeping you from night hosting consider the following.

Your night hosting is to provide a welcoming rooming arrangement, breakfasts and 2-3 dinners while the other dinners and day activities are provided by other club hosts. You will be invited to the evening parties as well. The day hosts take care of transporting and showing the ambassadors around the area although we have found the day host trips enjoyable for ourselves. We think the most enjoyable times as night hosts is to engage in conversation getting to know our guests - their presence has been a gift to us!

Spending a week together with travelers from our country or in another country is a unique and fun experience. You get to exchange cultural viewpoints, share recipe's and when we travel with the club to other countries, we generally live the life of others in that culture. We've developed ongoing friendships with folks from other nations and had our preconceptions of the other nation changed. Hopefully we have helped our hosts develop a positive view of our nation and its citizens as well.

Please consider all these ideas when the club hosts another group and you are asked to night host. The time invested is well worth it.

A Day in the West Desert

Three FF-UT members (Rose, Judy, and Betsy) spent a perfect fall day in late October at **Camp Floyd State Park**, scouting for a possible FFI activity or exchange visit location.

Camp Floyd is just 45 minutes South from Salt Lake and located in the pioneer town of Fairfield Utah. The Park is about 1 mile square and has three well preserved buildings – a commissary from Camp Floyd, the StageCoach Inn, and a District School House. All the buildings are furnished with artifacts from the mid-1800's and have friendly Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Rangers on hand to explain the historical context.

Vistas to the West start the West Desert, and remain much as early travelers would have seen it. Picnic grounds and pavilions are pleasantly arranged in grassy courtyards under huge old elm trees planted by the town founders.

Camp Floyd was established in 1858 and housed Johnston's Army of 3,000 soldiers and camp followers – sent by President Buchanan to quell the "Mormon Rebellion". At it's height, Camp Floyd was the largest military installation in the United States and made the town of Fairfield the third largest in population in Utah. The Army peacefully dismantled the Fort after 3 years without ever firing a shot.

The **StageCoach Inn** was also established in 1858 just before Camp Floyd was built. The Inn was the first Overland Stage stop west of Salt Lake on the way to California, and the last Inn before the dreaded alkali desert crossing. Pony Express riders used the Inn as a way station. The first telegraph line to the West was strung through the Inn, with operators on duty. In 1870, Mark Twain took the stagecoach and stopped at the Inn as part of his cross country tour for the book "Roughing It". Family owned and operated, the Inn did not close until 1947.


The **District School House** was built in 1898 and served children of the area until 1937. It is fully restored and available for school groups to enjoy an authentic one-room school house experience.

Mid October starts the slow season for the Park, and we found the resident rangers eager to give us tours of all of the buildings – for a total of 2 hours! One ranger even chased us down in a four wheeler and opened up the school house just for us. In the school house he showed us some children's games like "Hoop and Stick" - of which Rose was the undoubted champion.

As we were leaving, Ranger Bob told us about the **Military cemetery** near by and that only 15 miles away on route 73 was the old mining town of **Ophir**. The cemetery has the remains of soldiers from Camp Floyd along with a plaque describing how they died – from dysentery to suicide to gunshot wound.

Ophir was a delightfully short drive up a starkly beautiful canyon. The town has been reinhabited by about 40 families, and remnants of the old mining activity are preserved throughout. Cows were wandering around the upper loop of the only road (paved) in or out and seemed unfazed by the occasional auto they shared the road with.

To end the day, we stopped in a Mexican restaurant in Tooele recommended by Judy that had to have the most authentic food north of Baja.
