


Jeremy Snook, our CEO (FF-I) and President, shared his vision for the future and SLC members, you can be assured we are in good hands.


#### Journey to Africa—October, 2023

### Utah Friendship Force Trip to Tanzania — Fall 2023

How do I summarize the trip of a lifetime? We never dreamed we'd go to Africa, but the friendship we established with the Africans we hosted through the Friendship Force during the summer of 2022 drew us halfway around the world to Tanzania. Since we wanted to make the most of investing 18 hours in flight to get there, we decided to also include two safaris along with our visit to Winston Mdegela, his school and the Iringa Friendship Force Club. Thus, we spent October traveling the national parks in Land Cruisers and staying with host families in Iringa. Additionally, some of us visited the intriguing island of Zanzibar before or after the official trip. What a melange of cultures-European, Arab, Indian and African!

Utah Friendship Force club members arrived from all parts north in Arusha, Tanzania on Saturday (10/14) and Sunday (10/15) and stayed at a lovely hotel, Kibo Palace, named after one of the peaks of Kilimanjaro. The highlight of the day, much to the dismay of some of our fellow male FF travelers, was shopping at Arusha's Cultural Center (Heritage Craft Mall) which made souvenir shopping so easy because the full panoply of crafts from throughout East Africa was so conveniently centralized in one building. They also had an art gallery and museum, but I never made it out of the shopping pavilion. One other highlight was upon our arrival at the Kibo Palace after shopping. Marv and I got caught up in a motorcade outside the hotel and wanted to see which important person was going to emerge from the official black car. We found ourselves shaking hands and speaking with Lt. General Othurman who is in charge of Tanzania's army.

Monday (10/16) we started our first safari with Augustine, the naturalist for AAAfrica and his two drivers, Yahiya and Nikson. In an attempt to shorten this narrative, I'll just list the national parks we visited, the animals we viewed during each safari and the places where we stayed. Words just don't do the animals justice. You'll need to see Rosalie Mirabelli's presentation in January with our merged photos. If you want more details, see me. I wrote out everything day by day.

During the first safari we visited Tarangire National Park, the Ngorongoro Conservation Area and Serengeti National Park. Interesting fact: The Ngorongoro Crater is called the African Garden of Eden because it has the highest concentration of wildlife in Africa due to the size of the crater floor which is 19 km wide. The animals we saw were: wildebeests, giraffes, zebras, Grant's gazelles, Thompson's gazelles, elephants, lions, baboons, flamingos, a black rhino in the far distance, hyenas, jackals, water bucks, cape buffaloes, egrets and crowned cranes. The unique places we stayed were: the Kibo Palace, a nice hotel in Arusha; the Ngorongoro Coffee Plantation with a pool nestled amongst lush vegetation covering the hilly area; Kubu Kubo Tented Lodge on a hillside where we heard incredible animal sounds all night and woke to see early morning movements of zebras filing past everyone's back porch doors and finally Kati Kati's Tented Camp on the Serengeti plains with the zebras and tipped buckets of water for our "showers."

The second safari with the Bateleur company and drivers Serafino and David was bisected by a home stay with our Iringa Friendship Force hosts. The first part of the safari took us to Selous National Park then to Morogoro. The 10 hour drive to Morogoro through the Matombe mountains revealed a lot of deforestation due to the burning of crops, the gathering of firewood for cooking and the creation of charcoal as another source of fuel for cooking. Finally, we drove through Mikumi National Park to Iringa. Regarding animals, we didn't see any new ones, just enjoyed the drive through the baobab forests of ancient trees to Iringa. During this second safari the place we stayed at in Selous Park was the Jimbiza Lodge by the Rufigi River where we "melted"-it was so hot and humid. Thankfully, the boat safari was cooler than being on land. The next night we stayed at the Cate Hotel which was a very nice hotel with a pool.

The next day, Wednesday 10/25, we visited Winston's school, Wendyrayna, which is a boarding school for orphaned and abused kids ages 12-18 tucked back in Iringa's encircling hills. This visit was a highlight for Utah Friendship Force members and students alike. When we arrived, the students stood at attention outside and greeted us with songs and a dance by one boy. Then we all entered one big classroom, with students at the back and Utah Friendship Force members on the sides. Winston and the headmaster explained about the school, then Samuel, Winston's son who was temporarily teaching at the school, led the students in several song and dance numbers. This was followed by lunch for all. There was such an amazing outpouring of love and gratitude from everyone at the school. Something we'll never forget.

The following morning, Thursday 10/26, was a free day with our hosts. Winston took us and Judy to Isimila to see the sandstone pillars and the area that was excavated in the 1950s for tools from homo erectus 300,000 years ago which were collected in a sheltered space on the canyon floor for visitors to see.

After Isimila, we went to Igeleke Rock without Judy to see 30,000 year old pictographs of elephants, giraffes, antelopes and wig-wam like dwellings. Samuel joined us for the hike and following dinner where Marv and I took Winston's family to a nice restaurant, Mt. Royal. Friday 10/27 Bateleur with David and Serafino drove us to Ruaha National Park. We stayed at Mwagusi Safari Camp and did an evening game drive. I felt like a piece of pizza in a hot oven sleeping at this camp. It was so hot!

Saturday 10/28 we did an early morning uneventful game drive through Ruaha National Park leaving the park midday. After exiting we stopped at a Maasai roadside stand to buy some souvenirs. That was quite a photographic event. Further on down the road we stopped again to film Maasai kids jumping.

Back in Iringa we showered and went to the farewell dinner at Shadrack #2's house. Lots of speeches, great food and another outpouring of very sincere emotions. We really connected emotionally with our Iringa Friendship Force hosts.

The next day, Sunday 10/29 we all gathered at a Lutheran center for our trip to the Iringa Airport where the main group was flying to Zanzibar or home and we headed north with David driving us to Shadrack's home in Kondoa. Shadrack had made the long trip to Iringa to join us at the party and to accompany us to his hometown.

Monday 10/30 Marvin, Shadrack and I with our driver, David, drove north to Kolo, a World Heritage Rock Painting site to view 6,000+ year old pictographs. Amena, our guide, was extremely knowledgeable and gave us very specific information about all three sites at Kolo.

After returning from the rock art site, we visited Shadrack's neighbor who keeps 40-50 horizontal African beehives in hollowed out logs.

We visited Shadrack's church the next morning and then toured Kondoa's spring that provides water for the entire town. That evening we were welcomed by Shadrack's students at the Embecko Secondary School. Again, we were given a loving welcome in song and dance by the 130 students. Speeches from the gracious administrators followed.

After this experience we were hosted for dinner by Shadrack's friend, Ikunda. She gave us parting gifts and so did Shadrack and his wife, Neema.

The following day 11/1 David drove us to Augustine's home where David's Land Cruiser broke down, but David got us a shuttle to take us to our final African hotel, Rivertrees by Kilimanjaro Airport. Rivertrees is an amazingly beautiful place with individual cabins scattered about in a 10 acre rainforest area.

Alas, it was time to go home. On Nov. 2nd we began our return trip from Kilimanjaro Airport to Doha, Qatar, to Seattle, Washington and finally to Salt Lake City, Utah. It's great to travel, but it's great to be home, too.

What an incredible journey!






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
