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# Friendship Force of Utah visits the Caribbean Island of Guadeloupe February 9th through 16th.

**Guadeloupe** is an archipelago and overseas department and region of France in the Caribbean. It consists of six inhabited islands—Basse-Terre, Grande-Terre, Marie-Galante, La Désirade, and the two inhabited Îles des Saintes—as well as many uninhabited islands and outcroppings.

Antigua, Barbuda, Montserrat and the Commonwealth of Dominica are close by.

Guadeloupe has a long sorrowful history of sugar plantations and the slave trade in Colonial times. First settled by the Spanish, it was under British, French, and Swedish dominion until the late 1800's when it became a Department of France, and has remained a Department to this day.

Guadeloupe's rich history of native peoples and colonization has made for a vibrant mix of cultures - Music, Dance and Cuisine have African, Carib and European influences.

Like the other overseas departments, it is an integral part of France. As a constituent territory of the European Union and the Eurozone, the euro is its official currency and any European Union citizen is free to settle and work there indefinitely. However, as an overseas department, it is not part of the Schengen Area. The region formerly included Saint Barthélemy and Saint Martin, which were detached from Guadeloupe in 2007 following a 2003 referendum.

Christopher Columbus visited Guadeloupe in 1493, during his second voyage, and gave the island its name. The official language is French; Antillean Creole is also spoken.

#### Activities while we are there:

**Carnival!** The month-long celebration will be taking place while we are there. Therese, the club President has arranged for us to visit members' homes in the city for the parade. Therese says the whole town turns out, and we will dance!

Cultural museums, gardens, beaches, visiting the Murder in Paradise film set/ village, a canal boat trip, and the Cousteau reserve are all in the plans.

### The rules of travel to Europe have changed

Starting in mid-2025, some 1.4 billion people from over 60 visa-exempt countries are required to have a travel authorization to enter most European countries. It was scheduled to take effect in 2024 The European visa waiver system is being implemented with the objective of improving global security and safety. The requirement is an online travel authorization via the European Travel Information and Authorisation System, or ETIAS.

# Visit to Wendyrayna School in Tanzania

Our visit to the Wendyrayna School was one of the highlights and most memorable parts of our stay in Iringa, Tanzania. The Director of this school, Winston Mbegela is a member of Friendship Force and was the host for Jeanne and Marv. Winston has also visited Salt Lake and stayed with Marv and Jeanne at that time, so they were already friends.

Wendyrayna has been accredited since 2014 and has been accepting students since 2015. Approximately 75% of the graduates have gone on to college or university. The rate of girls in Tanzania who graduate is about half the rate of the boys. It is the same in this school. They are hoping to change that and for this year have enrolled many more girls than previously. The students in this school range from 12-19 years of age. The younger ones are in the equivalent of middle school here. Then they have the equivalent of 10th, 11th, and 12th grades. After this, if they can attend college which is like a trade school, or they go on to university. The ages do not necessarily line up with the grades because some students are unable to go to school until they are older, depending on their family situation.

At any rate, we visited the school on our first full day in Iringa. That day was amazing. The students seemed so excited and happy to greet us and welcome us. They sang and danced for us. It was so touching it brought me to tears.

It happened to be Jim's birthday the day we visited. That is a birthday I'm sure that Jim will never forget. First, Winston wrote Jim's name of the chalk board and then the students all sang "Happy Birthday" to Jim. A cake was brought in for all of us to share. It was one two tiered cake, and it was for all of us - about 45-50 people. Each of us was served one bite of cake served on a toothpick. About half of the kids were on one side of the room and the other half on the other side. I was sitting very close to one group of kids. I will never forget the look on their faces when they knew they may get a piece of that cake. Their eyes were big and they just stared at that cake - they could not take their eyes off it. What a treat that bite of cake must have been for them.

At that point, each one of us stood up and spoke to the students. We thanked them for the dancing and singing and for being so welcoming to us.

We also met some of the faculty. I only remember the one named Glory. I am not sure what her title is, but she is a teacher and lives at the school and supervises the kids.

In Tanzania, good schools are not free. There are public schools available to students who live close enough to attend but none of them are good schools nor will they prepare these kids at all for a future. We heard time and time again how difficult it is to move on to a decent career without private schooling. Also, even if a public school is nearby, it is not safe for girls to walk - especially alone - to school. The students come to this school in two ways: 1) the families or students themselves request admission, 2) social workers, municipalities, churches, and NGOs approach Winston and ask on behalf of students who are in need. All of the schools in Tanzania have uniforms. It is simply not affordable to do anything else. In this school all uniforms and shoes are saved as hand-me-downs for the other students. The unemployment rate is 40% and so you can imagine how little people have and why many choose to keep their children home to work rather than to get an education. It also puts people in a very bad mood, so domestic abuse is high.

Most of these students cannot pay their tuition, board, or school supplies. In some cases the school picks up their basic necessities (we are talking super basic - toothbrushes, soap, underwear). In some cases the students' families are able to pay for basic necessities but not tuition/board or school supplies. Many of the families cannot afford two meals a day much less pay for their child's education. Even the students in the best situations, are NOT in a good situation. Things are very rough for these kids. There is not one of these students who does not need help.

It is a boarding school and most of the students stay at school when in session and go home for the holidays. Unfortunately, some of the students cannot or will not go home even during holidays. Some will not get enough food, some fear abuse (sexual and physical), some live too far away and can only afford bus fare once a year.

# Visit to Wendyrayna School (Continued)

Danny and I wanted to sponsor one of these students and selected a 15 year old girl who was one of the students who choses to remain at the school year round. She is a very motivated student but does not feel safe at home. Marv and Jeanne sponsored another girl just a little older. Before we selected a student to sponsor, we asked Winston to send us student profiles to help us decide which student we could help the most. If any of you have the means and inclination to support this school or one student in particular, I would be happy to forward to you the students profiles. In case you do have an interest, here are some costs:

School supplies for one student: \$75 per year

Basic necessities and clothing: \$75 per student per year

Tuition and board: \$900 per student per year

Of course, any amount will be appreciated and applied to the needs of the school or one of the students.

In addition to the Goldsteins and us, two others who we have asked have also chosen to sponsor one of these students. Our friend and neighbor has selected a young 15 year old girl who escaped a forced marriage; our friend felt this showed incredible bravery on the part of this girl and wanted to support her. My brother chose to sponsor a young boy who had been mentioned by the school as being a particularly bright and gifted student whose mother died in childbirth, his father is too poor to support him so his aunt provides his basic necessities.

We will not forget that the people who are in there trying their best to make a difference in their country by educating these kids - these are not rich people. They are hard workers with a vision to make their country better, one student and one school at a time.

For Danny and me, this experience was life changing. The situation is dire. Danny told me that I am not conveying how bad the situation is. People, it is bad! There is not one good situation in the group. The question is, whose situation is the worst and how can we help?

Please do what you can.
