Friendship Force September Meeting. Report by Betsy Heath

Margret opened the meeting by welcoming former Salt Lake City Mayor Palmer De Paulis and 40 Friendship Force members and guests. Several people have joined FF this month, and several are interested in knowing more about the organization.

Margret asked the group to think of places our club would like to visit in 2016. Kris will be sending out possible selections in mid-October. An informal poll is showing Eastern Canada, England, Paris, and Brazil to be popular. Cosette spoke for Chiapis, Mexico as an exchange site – she met a quite a few engaging and friendly club members from Chiapis on her recent FF cruise.

Speaker: Palmer De Paulis

Palmer De Paulis spoke and took questions from the audience on his experiences with the Ukraine during his time as Mayor of Salt Lake City and beyond.

In 1989 Salt Lake became a sister city (after some intense politicking!) to Chernivtsi, Ukraine.

Palmer opened with some poignant comments on “why” he sought to establish a relationship with a then Communist country. He reminded us that his effort, like FF, was establishing person to person relationships that fostered tolerance and built practical bridges to another culture.

Palmer gave a brief history of the country, pointing out it was only consolidated as a region during the modern Russian era. Ottoman, Austrian, Romanian, and Polish influences are all present from times past. In 1991 Ukraine became an independent country after the fall of the Soviet Union. Ukraine is one of the richest agricultural areas in the world, but also has developed a large industrial (steel), arts, and health care economic base.

Salt Lake City has assisted our sister city with technical assistance with infrastructure (water/sewer system design, airport expansion), an economic conference, and direct war disaster relief from the LDS church during the recent troubles. Ukraine professionals have participated in Nursing exchanges with Westminster and teaching/student exchanges with Salt Lake Community College.

Palmer stated Cold Fusion was a hot topic during his initial visits.
